\$2.125 MILLION FEDERAL GRANT RECEIVED FOR OPEN EDUCATIONAL RESOURCES CONSORTIUM

Last semester, UNM was selected as one of the recipients of the highly competitive federal Open Textbook Program grant. UNM has received a grant of \$2.125 million from the federal government, recognizing its commitment to advancing education through Open Educational Resources (OER). This grant, one of only five awarded nationwide, is set to transform the landscape of education in New Mexico.

The grant outlines a comprehensive plan to establish a consortium aimed at creating and sharing OER materials. UNM will collaborate with Santa Fe Community College and Central New Mexico Community College to expand access to affordable, high-quality educational resources across the state.

The grant's objectives include the creation of an OER center at UNM in partnership with the University of New Mexico Press.

The Workforce Advisory Board will play a critical role in ensuring that the materials meet the needs of the New Mexico workforce, thereby aligning with the program's primary goal: to provide students at UNM with affordable education, relevant workforce skills, and job opportunities within the state.

The grant is a testament to the collaborative spirit of New Mexico's educational institutions and the commitment to open education. UNM, SFCC, and CNM's shared vision for affordable, accessible education will benefit students across the state.



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INNOVATIVE RENOVATION OF ZIMMERMAN CLASSROOM

This spring the University Libraries announced the completion of a transformative renovation project in Zimmerman Library's classroom B30, aimed at enhancing the learning experience for students through innovative design and collaborative spaces.

The renovated B30, located in the basement of Zimmerman Library, now boasts a total space rearrangement, focusing on fostering collaboration among students and creating an environment conducive to active learning. Gone are the traditional individual computers; instead, the room features eight collaborative stations strategically placed to facilitate group work.

Each collaborative station is equipped with a versatile monitor that can be raised or lowered, providing students with the flexibility to engage in shared projects or mirror the content displayed on the instructor's screen. Each station also has multiple connection options so students can attach their own laptops or tablets. This design ensures that all students have an unobstructed view of instructional material, fostering an inclusive and engaging learning environment.

Extra projectors have been strategically placed around the perimeter of the room, ensuring that everyone, regardless of their location, has a clear view of instructional content.

The renovated B30 aligns with the latest best practices for designing learning spaces, emphasizing collaborative learning environments that encourage student participation and engagement. The University Libraries team is committed to creating spaces that reflect contemporary educational methods and provide students with the tools they need to succeed.

This renovation represents a significant investment in the future of education at UNM and underscores the institution's dedication to providing cutting-edge resources for its students.

PEDACITOS DE RESISTENCIA:

SOCIALLY ENGAGED WORK IN LATIN AMERICAN SPECIAL COLLECTIONS

Pedacitos de Resistencia maps socially engaged work in the Center for Southwest Research and Special Collections. Drawing from the Latin American and U.S Latinx special collections, this exhibit spans various time periods, geographies, genres, and mediums to highlight the many ways communities and artists have documented, represented, and responded to social issues that range from migration to education, violence, politics and traditions.

Items in this exhibit play with form and function. They use mediums, genres, and materials in non-traditional ways to make a social statement — a book made of recycled cardboard to combat literacy, or migrant narratives captured on paper made from the cotton of their clothes, or the burlap patchwork of the arpilleras to denounce oppression.

Pedacitos de Resistencia offers archival snapshots, pedacitos (pieces) of collections to briefly showcase how socially engaged work can capture different histories, narratives, and imaginaries.






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




Hard Grass Life on the Crazy Woman Bison Ranch by Mary Zeiss Stange


Gold Medal Winner for Best Regional Non-Fiction, 2011 Independent Publisher Book Awards


Storytelling in Yellowstone Horse and Buggy Tour Guides by Lee H. Whittlesey

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OILS INTRODUCES ARNDT-WONG SCHOLARSHIPS

OILS introduced two new scholarships this semester aimed to support current OILS students within the doctoral and master's program to continue and complete their degree. OILS doctoral candidate, Nisansala Bandara, received \$1,500 for academic support. Bandara is a first-year Ph.D. student whose research interests include training & development, leadership, and employee engagement. The application and review process for the master's program scholarship is currently taking place.

The scholarship was created by leading members of the UNM and Albuquerque community, Dr. Siu Wong, her spouse, Dr. William Jones, and sister, May Wong Arndt. Siu Wong previously served as the President of the Chinese American Citizen's Alliance (C.A.C.A.) Albuquerque Lodge and led the efforts for placing the plaque honoring Chinese American pioneers on the Imperial building in downtown Albuquerque.

In her career as an optometrist, she has served as the Director of the Division of Eye Care for the U.S. Public Health Service - Indian Health Service program in Albuquerque. William Jones, who is also an Optometrist, graduated from the UNM Biology department in 1969. He has worked with the Veterans Administration and founded the Optometric Retinal Society.

Dr. Wong and Dr. Jones championed raising funds for a monument to commemorate a landmark Chinese American civil rights case, Territory of New Mexico v. Yee Shun Chinese (1882). The monument is located at the Bernalillo County Courthouse.

They continue to be avid donors at UNM and currently sponsor the Dr. William Jones and Dr. Siu Wong UNM Biology Department Urgent Needs Endowed Fund.

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
